"We're about seeing something you don't see every day," Chantland said.

For instance, the 1939 motorcycle that periodically shows up with its frame made out of Ford Model T parts and a Chevy engine isn't something you can see at just any car show.

The event was intended to create a nostalgic atmosphere where mechanical-minded folk could show off some of their creations.

It is a spin-off from Maple Lake's Days of Old celebration which included a car show.

Days of Old in turn evolved from an informal gathering of gear-head guys and gals in the parking lot of the Old Creamery, which Chantland owns.

Chantland had the idea for that first organized event then teamed up with local auto enthusiast John Rivers to make it a reality.

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Meet the gear-heads behind the Get Together

There is no other show quite like the Gear-Head Get Together. It is a unique venue where people of a mechanical mind can gather together to see and marvel over the contraptions and conveyances of likeminded folk. But the show couldn't go on if not for the equally unique and creative crew that puts it all together.

Scott Chantland

Scott Chantland is the visionary and the instigator behind the Get Together. It was his dream of an unusual getting together of gear-heads that began it all seven years ago. With his leadership, it grew from a simple car show during Maple Lake's Days of Old celebration to the enormous success it is today.

"The reason I started the event was because the opportunity was there to create something different while at the same time benefiting the Maple Lake community," he said.

Chantland has been a gear-head since he was a kid.

"My father use to drag race twin engine triumph motorcycles in the late '60s and early '70s, and later in life I got into collecting antique motorcycles, so you could say I have been around mechanical things my whole life. Especially things with two wheels and a motor."

His first love is motorcycles, but extends to classic cars as well.

"I think if you are into mechanical things whether it be cars, bikes, tractors, aircraft, etc., you really cannot help yourself. If you have a mechanical mind (gearhead) you are automatically attracted to mechanical things," he said.

Currently, Chantland enjoys finding anything in an original paint motorcycle, scooter, plus home-built contraptions.

John Rivers

John Rivers is another founding member of the Gear-Head Get Together. He has been a gear-head nearly all his life.

"I acquired my first car, a 1931 Model A Ford, when I was 13 years old. My grandfather bought it for twenty-five dollars and gave it to me," he said.

Ford truck that he enjoyed buffing up and driving, he said. In May of 1957 he bought a 1926 Model T Ford Roadster for \$15 and still has the car in his collection. Later that summer he bought a 1931 Model A Ford Coupe from a junk yard in Hutchinson and turned it into a rod. "The picture on this year's Gear-Head tee shirt is me with that rod in August 1957," he said.

As the years went by Rivers acquired more collector cars. He has been a member of AACA, Antique Automobile Club of America, since 1963.

"I can say I have always loved the hobby because mechanics is in my DNA," he said.

As for the Gear-Head Committee, he enjoys hosting meetings and working on ways to promote the event.

At the moment, he is not working on any major projects. The last one was rebuilding the entire engine and drive train on son, David Rivers, 1910 Buick.

"However, I am doing some minor work buffing up a 1947 International KB 2 pickup. My dad sold these when they were new and I can still recall the smell inside the cab of a new one. This truck is one that should not be restored because it is complete down to the fine details. In recent years there has been a greater interest in preserving original features."

Larry Greene got involved about five years ago with Gear-head.

"I have been a car enthusiast all my life starting with a '50 Oldsmobile in school."

Since then many classics and muscle cars such as Corvettes, GTOs, etc., have come his way.

He and his wife, Vicki, both enjoy cars so it was natural for them to be involved in the Get Together. The two also serve as a Grand sponsor of the event.

Don Ramstad

Don Ramstad has been a gear-head since he was a kid when his dad started bringing him to car shows.

"I enjoy the cars and trucks from the 1950s the most," he said. "I like the unique body lines and character they have."

He joined the Gear-Head crew three years ago because he enjoys the show and wants to help ensure that it continues.

One of his favorite projects is a 1955 Chevrolet pickup that was in pieces when he bought it.

Although he wasn't part of Gear-Head in its early years - back when it was just an impromptu gathering one August day when it evolved into more and a committee developed to more formally plan, he was recruited and joined.

"My largest contribution to the Gear-Head Committee is attending our monthly meetings where I listen, make a few comments, point my finger and enjoy the other members doing all the 'hard work.' It is a really great team," he said. "I also, along with Roger James, organize the Gear-Head Swap-Meet which is the primary event of the show. We have a small but dedicated team of volunteers that direct the vendors to their spot to sell in the Swap Area."

"As a committee, we are all looking forward to the big show, welcoming our guests and promoting Maple Lake as the Great Community it already is," he said.

Becky Hance

Becky Hance developed her love of machines from her dad who is a mechanic. As a child, she spent all her spare time hanging around his shop.

"Tve just always loved cars, the body lines, the smell of burnt rubber and diesel," she said.

Roger James got his start in the old car hobby when a friend told him about a 1936 Chevrolet pickup that his brother wanted to sell.

"Once I saw it I could picture how nice it would look fixed up, so I bought it and restored it to new condition," he said.

"I love returning old vehicles to the way they looked and operated when they were new. When taking part in car shows around the country I have made friends

from all over the U.S. When we attend these events, it is like a family reunion," he said.

He and his wife, Mary, (also a member of the Gear-Head Committee) provided the featured vehicle, a 1959 Chevrolet Station Wagon for a Days of Old event, and that is how they both became involved in Gear-Head.

The James' bought the wagon years ago from the Maple Lake Fire Department who had bought it new. The couple restored it in time for the Maple Lake Centennial Celebration.

The last project James worked on was just finished this summer in time to take it to Wisconsin for a Buick Club of America National Meet. It is a 1967 Buick GS400 convertible with a 4-speed transmission that he bought from a salvage yard in South Dakota in about 1982.

Mary James

Mary James remembers the day her husband told her about the 1936 pickup he wanted to buy from their friend's brother.

"When asked what he was going to do with that, he responded 'fix it up' and so began my involvement with the old car hobby," she said.

That was 1971, and old cars were easy to buy for very little money. Soon more showed up at their place in the country, and always Chevrolets for many years. The couple became involved with the Vintage Chevrolet Club of America, traveled to car shows and swap meets (flea markets with only car-related merchandise) all over the midwest and met "great people."

"It was our annual vacation for five or six days in the summer," she said.

"I fell in love with the hobby because it preserves history, feeds my curiosity on how things work and go together, and gives me the opportunities to experience new things, new places and meet new people."

Mary and Roger both became involved with the Gear-Head Committee in 2011 after being asked by John Rivers, "a hard guy to say no to," she said.

"Being that I was retired, it gave me an opportunity to stay involved with the community of Maple Lake, my hometown and place of employment for 37 years. I enjoy working with details, organization, and looking at the big picture," she said.

As for a favorite gear-head project, "whatever we are showing, driving or working on is always my favorite until I move to the next," she said.

"Folks in Maple Lake particularly enjoy seeing the 1959 Chevrolet Kingswood station wagon we own that was purchased new by the Maple Lake Fire Department in 1959, used first as an ambulance, then as the first vehicle on the scene of the fire with firemen arriving prior to the first trucks, and then as a fire chief car before being replaced with newer equipment. When the department decided to sell the wagon, they requested sealed bids to be submitted and we were fortunate to have

body and paint work. His family moved to Annandale at the start of his junior year of high school. There he ran into his good friend Pete Miessen who loved to "mess around with cars." Miessen was the mechanic and Zieska made the vehicles look good.

"He (Miessen) was the instigator. He got me hooked," Zieska said.

After a few years at St. Cloud Technical School he opened Mike's Custom Paint where he custom painted new cars and trucks and did collision repair. Eventually

that business turned into what is now known as MCP Collision and Glass in Annandale.

Over the years, Zieska has restored many older vehicles that have gone on to win trophies. One of those was a Porsche that the owner then took to a car show in California where it won Best of Show and Best of Class.

A couple of Zieska's biggest projects include the old Bronco II that he restored every inch of, and then there was the '67 Camaro he restored back when he was still a student in tech school.

"It's enjoyable taking something and making it new again," he said.

Zieska joined the Gear-Head crew back when it was still just a car show during Maple Lake's Days of Old celebration.

"The passion and the skill these people have is amazing," he said. "It's nice to be part of a group that has that much passion."

Pete Miessen

Pete Miessen is another passionate gearhead who has had an interest in everything

"I was born into it," he said. "That's all I've known all my life. When I was little I would take anything apart to see how it works."

Miessen joined the group when Gear-Head was in its second year. He specializes in doing promotional work, managing the volunteers, setting up entertainment and finding new features to attract more people.

When not working on the Get Together, he is involved in off-road jeeps and motorcycles and numerous other projects.

"I was asked by the committee to join their ranks, and I thought it was a great way to support the town since I have lived in the area all my life," he added.

Linda Rassat

Although she claims to not be a gearhead at all, Linda Rassat has been helping with the event since it was still a part of the Days of Old celebration in Maple Lake.

"John Rivers was looking for some volunteers to help register cards on the day of the event and I wasn't busy that day so I showed up to help. I have been a part of the fun ever since," she said.

Hans Melgaard

Hans Melgaard, owner of Melgaard Services, joined the committee a few years ago. His enthusiasm, willingness to go the extra mile as well as his humor and wit make him a valued member.

Dan Albrecht

Dan Albrecht has been with the group

since the early years. He is the "go to" food guy and idea man.

Tricia Manuel is the clothing merchandise specialist. She has Gear-Head items embroidered and sells them at the Costume Shoppe.

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Old stuff, new leather

By Bob Zimmerman Take a look at the awards section of award winning leather artist Mike Bray's website

(brayleatherstudio.com) and you will find that he is a master artisan. Take a walk with him in his shop and back yard and you will find that he is a gear-head, first class. Talk with him and you will find how these attributes combine to inspire and create his unique artwork.

Bray specializes in adding tooled leather to antiques to make one-of-akind pieces and is often commissioned to create pieces that tell a special story, honor a loved one or represent a certain lifestyle. His work reflects both his clients' wishes and his dedication to melding something old with something new to create something beautiful.

The gear-head side of Bray: He likes the style and sound of old outboard motors and estimates he has "about 70 of them." One is an old three-horse Johnson clamped to the stern of the 1949 Larson fishing boat tied to his dock and used regularly. Another, a 35 hp Johnson, powers his 1955 18-foot Larson Cabin Special Cedar Strip boat that is used for special occasions. Bray admits he likes to watch heads turn as he mo-

tors by in his classic craft. Asking about his favorite outboard leads to an introduction to his recently acquired 1917 Evinrude detachable row boat motor.

Restoring rare, 100-year-old mechanical devices is not one of Bray's many skills and he hopes to eventually find someone with the knowledge to do the job right.

The Artist side of Bray: He has always collected old stuff and enjoys going to the vintage car shows to see what he can find. He goes to Gear-Head every year and says, "it is one of the better shows for variety." He tries to "get there early and spend the day because there is plenty to do." His schedule for this year's event is pretty tight because he has to be in Alexandria to help a friend with a concert, so he plans to get to Gear-Head early and stay as long as possible, which won't be long enough. He will be looking for anything that fires a creative spark for a new project. Past inspirations include customizing the seat of a 1950 Chevy pickup with leather upholstery featuring a bronc rider in the middle panel. Vehicle door frames have become windows for his handtooled leather works of art, grandpa's old wooden tool box

morphs into a unique storage container when personalized with embossed leather on the top and sides, and using the bow of a 1958 Alumacraft boat to frame two colorful anglers landing a fish with the caption "Memories made at the lake last a lifetime" creates a display suitable for the finest lake home or any cabin up north.

The inside door panel from a Woody station wagon will serve to display a new creation when Bray's imagination determines what leather work to merge it with.

some radio commercials and TV show theme songs that will make some laugh and others cringe as they remember the classic "My Mother the Car." Larcom excels at recreating an era when cruising after dark with the radio on was just what you did.

Larcom knows cars and machines, having been in the radiator repair/custom exhaust business since 1998. He also knows the music, having been in the radio business for 40 years. Stepping into the reception room of DL's Radiator and Exhaust in Buffalo punches your ticket for a ride on the Way-Back Machine to the '40s, '50s and '60s. Every nook, cranny and crevice is filled with memorabilia of things taken for granted then and fondly remembered now. Doing "The Stroll" in his shop reveals a slightly chaotic collection of stuff and such from the middle of the last century. Larcom loves the old cars and the old music and admits to "being in heaven" when he gets to blend the two together as a disc jockey.

Talking cars and music history with Larcom is a free-wheeling expe-

rience with overdrive. In the early 1930s, a company combined motor vehicles and Victrola to rebrand themselves as Motorola when they created the first commercially successful car radio. Car crash songs like "Deadman's Curve" and "Tell Laura I Love Her" were banned by the BBC because they were too intense for their listeners. Are you drivin' a stick? Three in the Tree or Four on the Floor? From 1956 to 1958 you could buy a Chrysler with a Highway Hi-Fi record player and Larcom says his wasn't very good. The Wonder Bar radio allowed hands-free station selection; you had to use your foot on the pedal next to the dimmer switch. Wolf Whistles for your hot rod's tail pipe were supposed to impress the ladies. The one Larcom has is still in the original packaging and is going to stay there.

You might have to "Take a Ralph" or "Hang a Louie" at the next intersection on Memory Lane to get to Drag City. Be sure to give a wave to the Little Old Lady. Go ahead and take that Detour; You've got No Particular Place To Go. Enjoy the Gear-Head Get Together, enjoy the music and enjoy the memories.

It was the first chance we really got to look at all the vehicles. That many exotic cars in one place was fun to see," Janel said.
